## Jesus' Apostles: Crossing Social, Economic, and Political Barriers

The selection by Jesus of His apostles reflects not only his divine mission, but also a direct challenge to the societal norms and prejudices of his time. By choosing such a diverse group of individuals from various backgrounds, Jesus transcended the barriers that often divide humanity. These were common, ordinary men, representing the working class of their day. They had not been to the rabbinical schools and were not associated with the religious elite. Acts 4:13 states: "Now when they [the religious leaders of the day] saw the boldness of Peter and John, and perceived that they were uneducated and untrained men, they marveled. And they realized that they had been with Jesus." In choosing the men He did, Jesus crossed social, economic, and political barriers.

In the first century, Judea was a region marked by significant social hierarchies, economic disparity, and political tension. The Jewish people were under Roman occupation, which created a complex relationship between the oppressors and the oppressed. Socially, there were clear divisions between the wealthy elite, the religious leaders, and the common people. Economically, many were struggling under heavy taxation and poverty, while politically, the landscape was fraught with conflict and resistance against Roman rule.

Jesus' choice of apostles was strikingly unconventional. He called individuals from various walks of life, each representing different social, economic, and political perspectives. Peter, Andrew, James, and John were fishermen from Galilee. They were part of the working class, living a life of labor and struggle. By choosing them, Jesus highlighted the value of ordinary people and their potential to be leaders in his ministry. Matthew, also known as Levi, was a tax collector, a profession often despised by the Jewish populace for its association with Roman oppression and corruption. By including Matthew. Jesus broke down the barriers of social stigma and demonstrated that redemption and purpose were available to all, regardless of their past sins. Simon the Zealot was part of a political movement that sought to overthrow Roman rule. His inclusion among the apostles illustrated Jesus'

ability to unite individuals with radically different political ideologies under a common mission of love and service.

By associating with fishermen, tax collectors, and political zealots, Jesus challenged the social orders of his time. He showed that spiritual authority and leadership were not confined to the religious elite but were accessible to all who would follow him. Jesus' teachings often focused on the poor and the oppressed, advocating for justice and compassion. His message transcended political affiliations, calling rather for an allegiance to the values set forth in Scripture.

Empowered by Jesus' teachings and example, the apostles went on to spread the message of Christianity throughout the Roman Empire and beyond. Their diverse backgrounds allowed them to connect with a wide range of people and engage with individuals from all walks of life. This enabled them to break down existing barriers and create a fellowship of believers from different cultures and social standings. The early church became a model of spiritual unity, where individuals from various backgrounds came together to worship and support one another. Jesus' selection of such a diverse group of men as His apostles reflects the core message of Christianity and underscores the universal nature of the Gospel.
